Winter Snow - Do You Know?

With roughly 230 miles of roads, during a winter storm, Public Works will be busy clearing the City roads, parking lots and access to City buildings. For our full Snow Plowing Policy, please visit the Public Works page on the City of Milford website, www.ci.milford.ct.us. Here are a few points to consider:

Plow Routes: Milford's over 900 public streets are cleared in order of priority. Main roads are addressed first with special attention to steep hills and difficult intersections. Side streets are done next, then dead-end streets. Side streets, for a time, may remain unplowed if repeat plowing is necessary on the main roads during heavy snowfall.

Blocked Driveways: All snow plows angle to the driver's right. This pushes the snow to the side of the road onto the snow-shelf sidewalk area, including the front of driveways. The only way to avoid having to repeatedly clear the end of the driveway and sidewalkis to wait until DPW crews have completed the curb to curb clean up of your road.

Keep Snow on Your Property: The City of Milford prohibits plow contractors and residents from pushing or throwing snow from private driveways, parking lots, and sidewalks onto City streets. If there is no other alternative to pushing the snow into the street, the plow driver must re-plow until the road is safe.

Parking: Parking off of the street helps speed up the snow clearing efforts. Alternate-side-of- the-street parking shall automatically take effect where parking is permitted on both sides of the street during any period of snow and/or ice where conditions necessitate that streets be plowed. Parking will be allowed on the odd numbered side of the street on odd numbered days and on the even numbered side of the street on even numbered days.

Did you know...

- Residents and businesses are responsible for clearing snow and ice from their sidewalks.
- Keeping street storm drains clear of leaves, snow and ice protects streets from icing over and developing potholes.



Finally, for everyone's safety...



- Clear snow around fire hydrants near your house. Seconds count when a fire occurs and it's critical for firefighters to find and access hydrants.
- ☑ Do not allow children to build snow forts or play near areas where plows and snow throwers are operating.

TAX COLLECTOR

The Tax Collectors office would like to remind taxpayers that the 2017 Grand List second installment of Real Estate/Sewer Use, Motor Vehicle, and Personal Property tax bills as well as Supplemental Motor Vehicle tax bills are due January 1, 2019 and you have until February 1, 2019 to pay without interest. No separate bills are mailed for the second installment taxes due. Supplemental Motor Vehicle bills will be mailed out at the end of December, this is an interim tax bill

> for vehicles registered between October 2, 2017 and July 31, 2018. For more information, including viewing tax bills and payment history online, visit the Tax Collectors webpage:

2019 Resident Parking Stickers will be available at the end of December. To obtain a resident parking

sticker in person, you must bring a copy of the current vehicle registration to the Tax Collectors office. If the vehicle is not registered in Milford then additional documentation is required to determine eligibility, contact the Tax Collectors office for more information. To obtain a resident parking sticker by mail, complete the 2019 Resident Parking Sticker form (located on the Tax Collectors webpage) and mail with required documentation and a self-addressed stamped envelope. All taxes must be paid up to date in order to receive a resident parking sticker.

MILFORD LIBRARY

Village Life: In New Haven's Little Italy Milford Library is pleased to host a screening of The Village: Life in New Haven's Little Italy on January 5 at 2pm. (Snow date is January 19). The film tells the story of the city's Wooster Square neighborhood, which for many years was a tight-knit Italian-American enclave. Using oral history interviews, photos from family albums, and historic films and photographs, the documentary explores the power of ethnic identity and reaffirms the importance of immigration to American society. Today, few descendants of the immigrants still live in Wooster Square, but vestiges of their community remain—in the church, the ethnic societies and their fiestas, and the pizza joints and pastry shops. Most vividly, the village lives on in the fond memories of the peo-

ple who grew up there. The film's director, Steve Hamm, is a freelance writer and documentary film maker living on New Haven's Wooster Square. He was a journalist for many years, working for the likes of BusinessWeek magazine and the San Jose Mercury News. Later he worked for IBM and Yale School of Medicine as a writer and editor. He is the author or co-author of four books, most recently Smart Machines, about the revolution in artificial intelligence. Steve has made a number of short films, some of which have been published on the Web sites of the New Haven Register and the New Haven Independent. Most of his films are community-building pro-

jects; he does the work on a pro bono basis

Who Needs the Flu Vaccine??

The winter months bring holidays, cold weather, sitting by the fire with family and friends, and...the flu! The flu - a contagious respiratory illness caused by influenza viruses - is the gift that keeps on giving. It is typically spread when an infected person coughs or sneezes near you. According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, people with flu can spread it to others up to about six feet away. The flu can cause mild to severe illness - sometimes even hospitalization or death. Symptoms may include fever, chills, cough, sore throat, runny or stuffy nose, muscle or body aches, headache and tiredness.

Flu activity is increasing in CT and we can expect to see more cases as we progress into the winter months. Why take the chance? The best way to prevent getting the flu is by getting the flu shot. The CDC recommends a flu shot for everyone 6 months or older. The Milford Health Department invites you to get your shot at one of our upcoming immunization clinics - December 11, 2018 or January 8th, February 12th or March 12, 2019 from 2:30 -4:30 pm. We also have the high dose influenza vaccine for those individuals 65 years of age and older. Please call 203-783-3285 with any questions.

Cold weather this season

Check out the Milford Health Department's Emergency Preparedness page for cold weather information. Below are 5 useful tips to prepare for the upcoming cold season.

- I. Plan Åhead- Prepare both your home and car for extreme cold weather every winter.
- Eat and Drink wisely- Caffeine and Alcohol both cause you to lose more heat. Opt for warm beverages instead like broth and hot chocolate.
- 3. **Dress warmly and Stay Dry** Wear a hat, gloves and scarf.
- 4. Avoid Exertion Cold weather puts an extra strain on the

heart. When cleaning snow dress warmly and work slowly 5. Be Cautious about travel- Listen for reports on travel

advisories from local news or National Weather service.

Know your flood hazard and have an evacuation plan and route with a rendezvous location planed before a storm happens! These sites provide valuable information and help in preparing for our next storm event including checklists of food and supplies you should have on hand.



ENGINEERING

The Engineering Department would like to remind residents that roof leaders and sump pump discharges are not allowed to discharge into the City Right of Way (Streets and Sidewalks). All discharge must be contained on the

property. It is a violation of the Ordinances to discharge water in such a manner as to create a nuisance on the sidewalks or roadways. Discharges may be discharged at grade, to drywells, or directly connected to the City Storm drainage system (subject to permit, available in the Engineering Department).

If there's a **fire hydrant** near your house, do your part to keep it accessible this winter:

3 ft



CLEAR-AWAY ZONE

Remove any snow and ice

Clear a wide enough perimeter

around the hydrant for firefighters to work (about 3 feet)

Clear a path from hydrant to street

If you have a hydrant in your front yard, please help us out by digging it out so it is clearly visible from the road and the fire fighters have easy access to it. The 5 minutes it takes you to do this may help save a life or property.

Residential Housing Improvement & Homeownership Programs

The Department of Economic & Community Development administers housing programs funded through the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) award by the Office of Housing and Urban Development.

Owners of single family and multi-family properties that meet program and income eligibility requirements may qualify for financial assistance to make energy efficient improvements such as roofs, siding and furnaces, and correct code violations.

The First Time Homebuyer's Program offers down payment and closing cost assistance to purchase a home in Milford.
